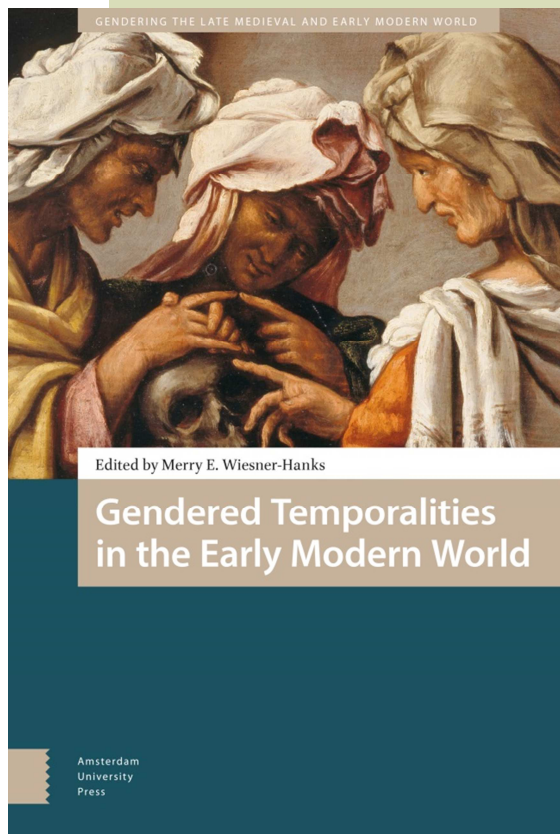

Gendered Temporalities in the Early Modern World

Is time gendered? This international, interdisciplinary anthology focuses on the early modern era to examine gendered and embodied temporalities. It analyses how material objects express, shape, complicate, and extend human concepts of time, and how time structured early modern lives and the commemorations of those lives. It examines women's and men's conceptualizations of time, and the somatic, lived experiences of time ranging from an instant to the course of family life. Drawing on a wide array of textual and material primary sources, this book assesses the ways that gender and other categories of difference affect understandings of time.



Merry E. Wiesner-Hanks is Distinguished Professor of History and Women's and Gender Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. She is the senior editor of the *Sixteenth Century Journal*, editor of the *Journal of Global History*, and an author or editor of more than thirty books that have appeared in ten languages.
